

## Example Lists of Supplies and Equipment for Emergency Bleeding Control Treatment Kits

Agencies and organizations should create their emergency bleeding control treatment kits according to needs and resources. Here are a few things to consider when determining what to include: Availability of supplies, the knowledge and training of responding personnel, whether to include items with expiration dates (such as gauze dressing impregnated with a hemostatic agent), bulk pricing options, ensuring legitimate high-quality supplies are purchased, etc.

*Note: Be sure to purchase items from a reputable supplier, as there are many poor-quality fake “knock-off” versions of tourniquets and bandages available in online stores; these items may fail during emergency treatment. See also: <https://www.bleedingkits.org/all-products.html>  
Treatment kits must be maintained and stored securely so that the contents are available in an emergency and are used solely for bleeding control.*

### Example 1:

- CAT Tourniquet
- 5”x9” gauze pad (2)
- 3” gauze roll (2)
- 4.5” gauze roll (1)
- 4”x4” gauze squares (4)
- Trauma shears
- Emergency bleeding control pamphlet
- Permanent marker
- Plastic zip top bag of gloves

### Example 2:

- CAT Tourniquet (1)
- Israeli “T3” trauma dressing (1)
- 5”x9” gauze pad (1)
- 4” gauze roll (1)
- Mylar emergency blanket (1)
- Penetrating trauma chest seal (2-pack)
- Hemostatic gauze roll QuikClot (1)
- Elastic compression bandage roll (1)
- Trauma shears (1)
- Permanent marker (1)
- Non-Latex gloves (2 pairs)
- Emergency bleeding control reference card
- All of the above are contained in a zip top bag

### Example 3:

- Pair of Nitrile Gloves (2)
- C-A-T Tourniquet (1)
- Compressed Gauze Z-fold Bandage 4.5” wide x 4.1 yards long (2)
- 6” Emergency Trauma Dressing (1)
- Trauma Shears (1)
- 5”x9” Trauma Pad (1)
- 2” Roll of Tape (1)
- Permanent marker (1)
- English/Spanish Bleeding Control Instruction Card (1)
